

# Meteors down Mariners 2-0 to lead Inter county loop

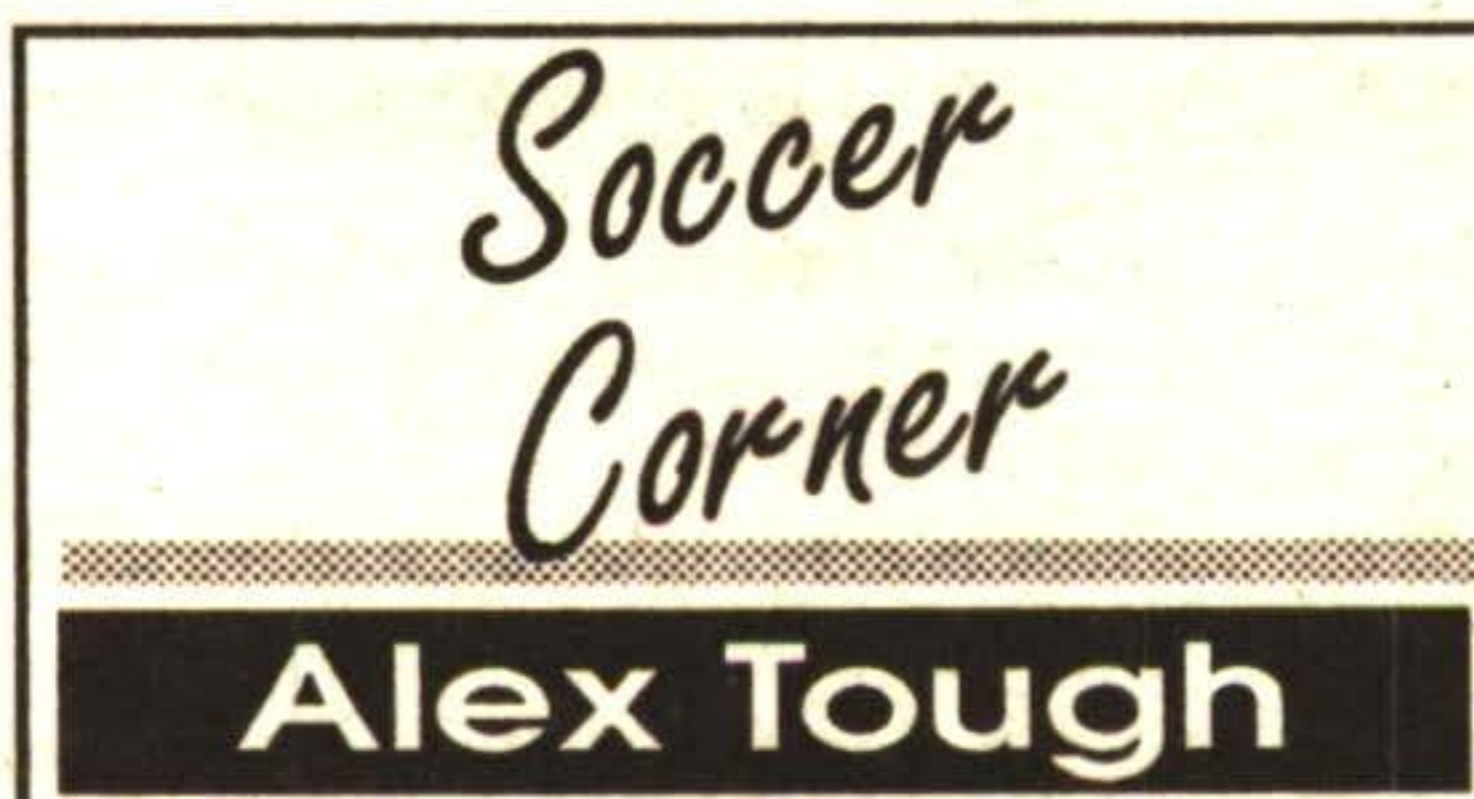

Stingers fielded one more player than allowed in their first game of the season, which they won. The game was awarded to their opponents, Milton. Three players who were ejected were given suspensions of between two and three games.

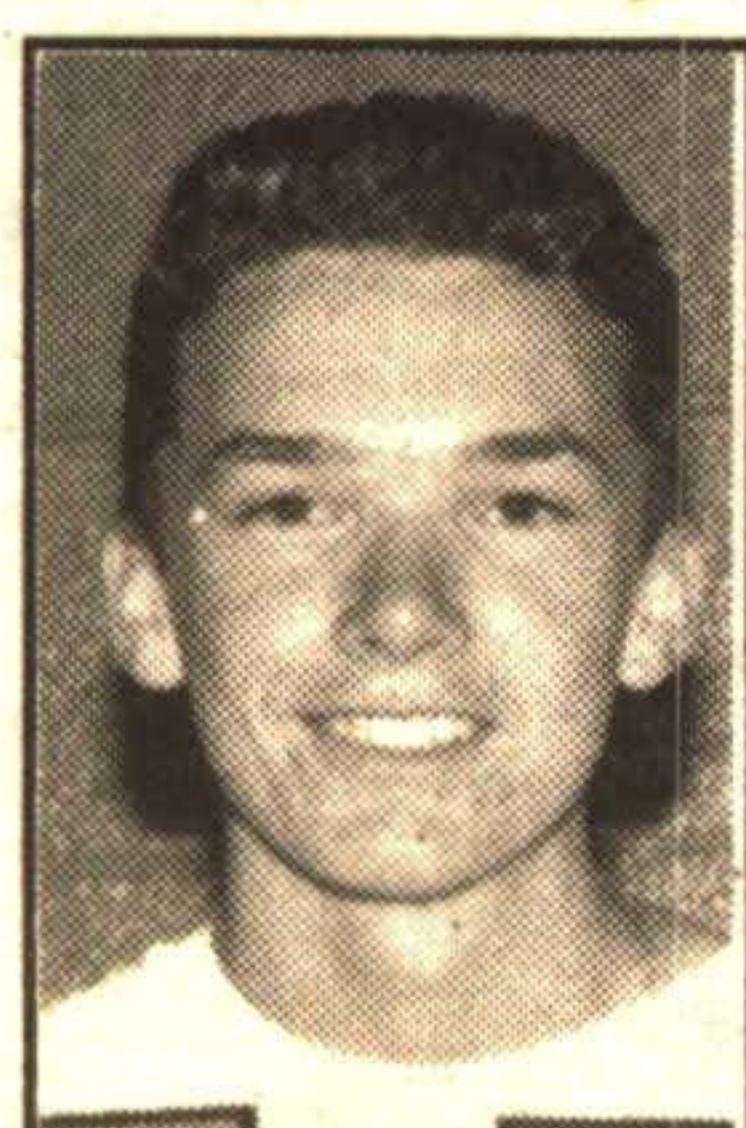
Kennedy and John Delcozzo had solid performances at the plate while catcher Steve Onoprijenko shutdown Burlington runners with some great defence.

## Athletes of the Week

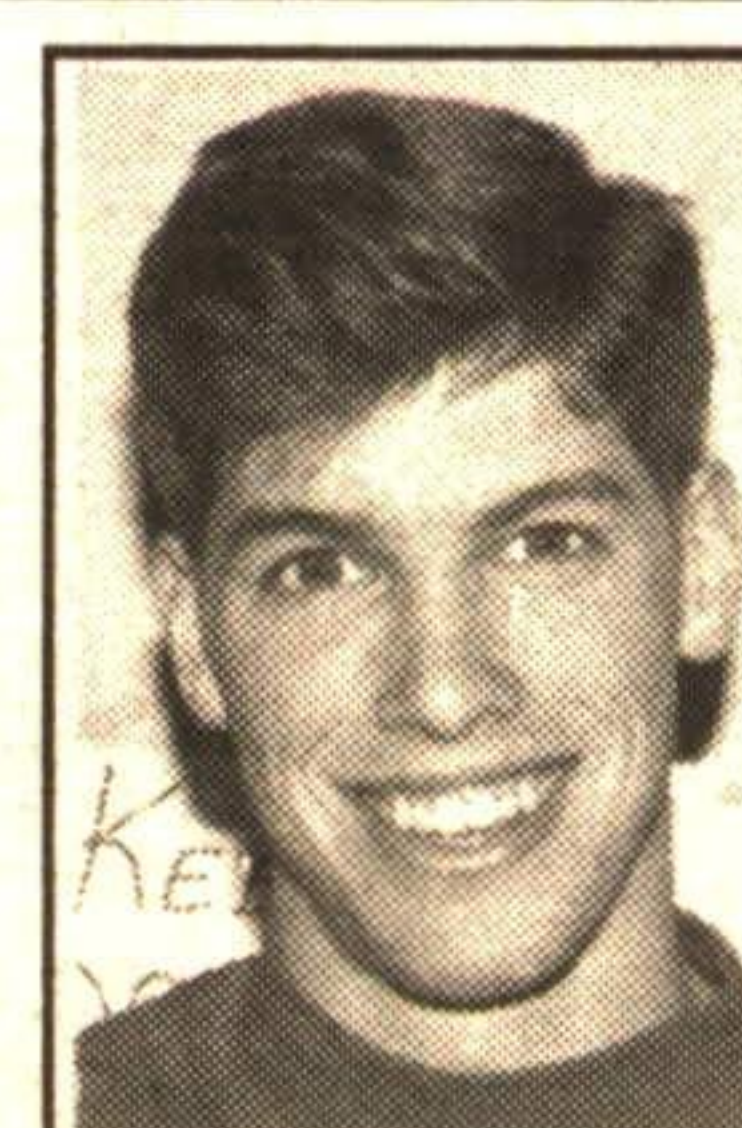
