## Georgetown track star continues his winning ways

Georgetown track and field star Matt Brain turned in another medal winning performance late last month in Toronto when he captured the gold in the decathlon competition (10 events) at the Ontario Junior Track and Field Championships.


Sixteen-year-old Matt, who recently finished Grade 11 at Georgetown District High School (GDHS), collected an outstanding 5,500 point total to earn a first place finish over the weekend meet, held June 26 and 27 at York University.

Matt competed in the 17 and under age group. A total of 30 top competitors from across Ontario took part in the decathlon competition.

"I was very happy with my results, particularly after the first day. The second day was very windy and rainy but I was able to stay focused and turn in some big finishes," said Matt.

During the first day of competition, Matt ran the 100 metre relay in 11.8 seconds, made a 6.02m leap in the long jump, took a 12.01m showing in the shotput, made a 1.82m high jump and finished the 400 metre relay in 54.7

Day two the local athlete run the 110m hurdles in 18.4 seconds, score a 32.4m discus throw squeeze out a 3.20m pole vault performance, hurl the javelin



44.90 metres and end the competition with a 5.30 minute finish in the 1,500 metre run.

1,500 metre relay were personal bests for Matt, who made a strong showing for himself at the high school level this season with first place finishes at both the Halton and GHAC finals in the junior boys' javelin throw and a trip to the OFSAA championships where he placed tenth in the province.

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders will have some new competition in the OHA Provincial Junior A league this season in the form of the Hamilton Kilter B.

The Kilter Bs are the newest addition to the league's west division, which will feature eight team for the 1993-94 hockey campaign and will see the regular season shortened from 49 to 42 games to make time for the Ontario and Central Canadian Junior A hockey tournaments in April.
