Although Love in Christ food bank is not running a Thanksgiving food drive, thanks to the goodwill of local residents, food donations have been pouring in over the past week.

Laura Ellison, coordinator of the Georgetown food bank, said several area residents have been dropping food donations for the foodbank at the Halton Hills fire station in Georgetown, the post office, Home Hardware, and other locations.

Along with a shortage in donations, Waldie said they are desperately searching for a new home for the food bank, which must vacate its present location in the Beardmore tannery building by Dec. 31.

Lisa Ellsmere, communications manager for Bell Canada, said the new exchange was recently introduced because all combinations of numbers in the other exchanges have almost been completely used.


Ellsmere said the number shortage in the two familiar exchanges is due to growth in the community and increasing use of cellular phones and fax machines.
