

CVCA wants dam refurbished

The CVCA would like to see the headpond at the Barber dam

This is what Ken Owen, the manager of land resources for the Credit Valley Conservation Area (CVCA) told people attending an open house on the Barber dam recently. The CVCA would like the headpond (the body of water in front of the dam) to be lowered permanently and the river channel

restored. "There are three important environmental reasons for removing it," he said in a phone interview. "The first is that it creates a barrier to fish migration. The Atlantic salmon can't go further upstream."

The headpond also warms the river below the dam during the summer, and trout don't like the warmer water. Third, the dam causes the water level in the headpond to increase during the spring and go down through the fall. This causes the banks of the river to become saturated with silt, making it hard for plants to become established, since the water washes them away and also causes erosion.

"We want to lower the headpond and plant the banks with trees and other vegetation," Owen said.

Most residents surveyed however want to keep the dam because of its historical significance. It was built in 1913 after an original dam built in the 1880s washed out during a flood on the river. This dam is recognized by the Ontario Heritage Foundation and was crucial to the development of Georgetown.

It would cost somewhere between \$461,000 and \$765,000 to carry out the various alternatives.

About 45 people attended the open house, which was hosted by the public advisory committee studying the Barber Mill dam as a flood and erosion control project under the Environmental Assessment Act.

According to the committee's findings, the public is split on the issue of keeping the headpond, or eliminating it. When asked if they were "in favor of an unobstructed passage of fish without the head-

pond," 38 per cent said they were, 34 per cent said they were not, and 26 per cent were undecided. The report concludes there is "sufficient ambiguity" about the relative merit of the headpond that a decision about it may require more input.

Committee member Reinhard Filter presented the results of the survey and other methods used to solicit public opinion.

The final report will be submitted to the CVCA, which will make a recommendation on Oct. 21.

"The Minister of Environment ultimately decides if he will accept the report, or if it will go through a more rigorous environmental assessment," Owen said.

It's official

It's official, the town will have a smoking bylaw in place beginning Jan. 3 next year. On Tuesday council upheld it's decision to pass the bylaw it passed the week before at the committee meeting. The bylaw will prohibit smoking retail stores, shopping mall concourses, service lines in commercial establishments, reception areas, elevators and escalators. Smoking will only be allowed in properly ventilated designated areas in health care facilities. Restaurants with gross sales more than 51 per cent in alcohol are exempt form the bylaw, but those under that must provide 25 non-smokers.


