Amnesty Coffee House features local artists

Sting won't be appearing at the Amnesty International Coffee House in Georgetown on Saturday, November 20.

But you can hear One World, the song he likes to sing at Amnesty International benefit concerts, performed by local artists Steve Ruggle, Mike Whaling, and Dave Haffey.

The trio have been friends since their days at Georgetown and District High School. They still get together to play music from the Beatles, Rolling Stones, the Tragically Hip, and Sting. "We record ourselves too" says Ruggle. "It's a fun thing for us."

Once again, the local Amnesty International group hopes to pack the hall at St. John's United Church, 11 Guelph Street, for its annual fundraising evening beginning at 7:30 p.m. on November 20.

As usual, there will be a mix of local talent, soothing the ear with a range of music from folk and country to a touch of classical and maybe some jazz, all coordinated by Amnesty International group member Jim Broughton.

Broughton has lined up guitarist extraordinaire Brent Cooper, and accomplished local musician Haydn

Evans, who says he'll add some Gershwin piano stylings to a repertoire of classical and pop favorites.

The Glen Williams trio Janice Giddings, Phil Lewin, and Kent Neame promise some Jazzy blues, and Broughton himself will be the evening's singing emcee, featuring songs of Stan Rogers and Gordon Lightfoot. Broughton points out that you never know who else might show up to perform.


Admission is \$4 at the door for adults, \$2 for students and seniors.
