Poulstrup upset with OHA over lifting of suspension

Georgetown Chrysler Raider president Finn Poulstrup is hoping to win a battle with the Ontario Hockey Association (OHA) over a player used by Milton in a game with the Merchants last week.

Poulstrup is upset by the Merchants' use of a possible illegal player situation during his team's game against Milton last Friday.

The scenario dates back to Tuesday, November 2 during a Merchants' home game against the Oakville Blades where Milton veteran Mike Cox received a two-game suspension for leaving the bench during an altercation between several other players.

According to Poulstrup, Milton contacted OHA Chairman Al Morris and asked him to look into the matter, claiming that Cox only left the bench to consult the referee and not to get involved in the altercation.

Under OHA rules, a team can't appeal a suspension under six games, according to Morris However, Morris decided the referee's call may have been an error and lifted the suspension temporarily until a review of the situation could be completed.

"From my standpoint, it appeared as though an error may have been made. Two things can happen after the review is completed, either the suspension will stand and the player (Mike Cox) will sit out the two games or the call will be determined an

OHA President Brent Ladds said that "it was Chairman Al Morris' decision and that there have been similar appeals accepted in the past. Milton does not have any special clout in the Ontario Hockey Association."




