## Georgetown trio lead Mauraders to national finals

Georgetown's Julie Ross, Sheri Nairn and Sarah Cunningham may find it difficult to show some teeth after last weekend.

But the three McMaster University students have plenty to smile about as members of the school's varsity women's soccer team.

The threesome returned from Montreal Sunday after competing in the national university championships where the McMaster

Marauders failed to qualify for the medal round of the six-team tournament. Missing the medal competition was new for the three women they were part of the squad that won gold in 1991 and finished fourth last year in two previous trips to the national event.

Ross, 22, and Nairn, 21, both physical education students, graduated from Georgetown District High School where they played soccer together as part of coach Ken Castledine's Georgetown Rebels.

Since then, Ross led McMaster in scoring for three straight seasons, tallying a career-high nine goals this year and being named a first-team All-Canadian.

For Nairn, her third year with the team has been very different from the previous two when she saw very limited playing time. "I got to step on the field this year," she said. "I know what the grass feels like."

"Three years at Mac have really improved her play," Ross said of Nairn. "It's been a matter of experience and coaching."

This past season, the two were housemates and both said they benefited from living with another member of the team.

"We experience the same stress modes when there's not enough time because of what school and soccer require," said Nairn.

"When we get back from practice, everyone else is done dinner so it's nice to have someone to sit down with and talk," Ross said.

Apart from being a leader on the scoreboard, Ross has also been the team's co-captain for the last two seasons and considered it an honor.

"I liked the role as a leader. I like to get the team up for the game," she said. "It certainly has made the last two years more mem-

Twenty-three year-old Sarah Cunningham, a fifth-year engineering and management student, joined the powerful Georgetown force when she moved to the city from Ottawa this past summer.

# Rebels claim Halton crown

The jinx has ended, the Georgetown Rebels senior boys' volleyball team are 1993 Halton Champions!

After three straight years of coming home empty-handed from the Regional finals, the senior Rebels finally pulled it all together and brought the title back to Georgetown Tuesday night. The team had last won the championship in 1989.

While at times it wasn't pretty, Georgetown distinguished themselves as the best team in Halton early Tuesday evening at Sheridan College in Oakville where they beat the M.M. Robinson Rams of Burlington in two straight 15-10 decisions.

The championship victory was that much sweeter as the Rams were the only team to beat the Rebels in regular season play this year.

"The jinx has ended," said Rebel team captain David Sands, clutching the Halton trophy minutes after his team's win, "We started off well today but as per usual, we lost our momentum and gave up a string of points. Fortunately, we were able to rebound and take the match. After being injured for the past two seasons, it was really nice to be healthy for the playoffs this year."

Appropriately, it was Sands who nailed down the final spike to give Georgetown its first Halton crown in four years. With a number of the players in their senior year at GDHS, this was the last chance many of the veterans had to win the title and

"This team set their goals early in the season to get back to the Halton finals," explained head coach Bob McKay, "We played a good game and were more successful at blocking their cross-shots compared with our last match against these guys. However, the Rams stopped Georgetown's offensive attack for several minutes and brought themselves back to within two points with strong serving and hitting. The Rebels got things rolling again as Ron Harrison and Matt Brain made some good blocks and Andrew Elliot put the game away with two big final serves.

It was Georgetown's turn to make the comeback in game two as Robinson capitalized on a disorganized Rebel squad and mounted an early 7-3 lead.

Jim Katsilieris came in for Elliot shortly after and made some big hits and serves and helped his team slowly chip away at the Rams' lead and tie the score 9-9.

The Rebels allowed the Rams just one more point before chocking up six unanswered points for the match victory. Deruchie had some trouble executing his hits in game two



First-year senior Sean Peasgood also came in during game two and made some solid plays including some effective serv-



Hamilton on Friday night to take on Barton High School in the






### Athletes of the Week
