## Bennett reaches NHL

# Local hockey stars climb ranks

While the NHL referees' strike and the resurgence of the Toronto Maple Leafs are what's getting the headlines these days, six local hockey stars are writing their own history this season - moving up the ranks of competition and bringing their dreams a little more into

### Adam Bennett

For 22-year-old Georgetown native Adam Bennett, the dream of playing NHL hockey (on a full-time basis) was realized early last month when he found a home with the Edmonton Oilers.

After two full seasons with the Chicago Blackhawks' farm team in Indianapolis, Bennett appeared ready to skate with the N.H.L. club this fall but was instead sent back down to play with the Ice.

"At this point, I talked with Gircago management about the possibility of a trade," explained Bennett, from his hotel room in weekend, Edmonton "Fortunately, Edmonton had a young team in need of defensemen and I was given a fresh start and a chance to play in the N.H.L."

After the trade (which sent Kevin Todd to Chicago) went through, Bennett played seven games with Edmonton's AHL club in Cape Breton and was then called up for NHL action near the end of October.

In 12 games, Adam has scored four points, taken three penalties and registered over 30 shots on net. The highlight of his season so far came three weeks ago when he recorded his first NHL goal against the St. Louis Blues.

"It was really nice, it was just a slapshot from the point that trickled through his (Curtis Joseph's) pads," Bennett explained, "Things have been going great here, we're not winning a lot of games but I'm gaining confidence and I feel positive I can play the rest of the season here. I'm not going to give them a chance to send me back to Cape Breton."

Also moving up a level of hockey this season was Acton's Daryl Filipek, who recently finished up a successful four-year stand at Ferris State University in Michigan and is now competing in the AHL with the

Hamilton Canucks (part of Vancouver's organization).

"It's been really exciting so far this season and things have been going good," said the 23-year-old rear guard "Compared to university hockey in the States, everything is a notch higher at this level."

Filipek says he had a good training camp with Vancouver and is now focusing on helping out Hamilton, who sits in fourth place in the Southern Division with a 7-11-1 record.

His best memory so far of professional hockey came October 29

However, Shevalier is back in action and is looking forward to this year's World Junior Championships, which are being held over the holidays Christmas Czechoslovakia.

"I've been playing pretty good since returning and I should be part of the team next month," said Jeff.

#### Mike Hudson

Former Acton Minor Hockey graduate Mike Hudson this season has had its share of ups and downs.

He was traded from the Chicago Blackhawks to the Edmonton Oilers near the end of last season but didn't fit into the Oilers plans this year.

After seeing limited ice time with the Oilers, the Rockwood native was shipped to the New York Rangers, where he was reunited with former Chicago coach Mike Keenan.

Hudson didn't get much of a chance to show what he could do in the Big Apple, earning a couple of assists in three games before a hand injury sidelined him.

He only recently returned to the Rangers line-up and counted an assist in New York's 5-4 win over Montreal on Tuesday. The Rangers recently ran their unbeaten string to 14 games, and are right behind the Toronto Maple Leafs in the battle for top spot overall in the NHL.


Kingston make a return trip to the Leyden Division finals this coming spring - and possibly take the All-Ontario title.






Athletes of the Week
