Business owners raise construction concerns

About 45 Guelph St. business owners packed the Halton Hills Chamber of Commerce office Thursday morning to voice their complaints and concerns to the town about the Guelph St. reconstruction project in . Georgetown.

At the meeting organized by the Chamber, Peter Linn, manager of Engineering Services for the town, responded to the brunt of the complaints but Mayor Russ Miller was also put on the hot seat.

The key concern of the business owners is the loss of business they say they have suffered due to the road work. The majority of

them say their business has dropped by about 30 or 40 per cent since the work began in June.

The \$3.5 million project, being done by Memme Construction Ltd. of Brampton, is slated for completion within two weeks.

Sodding and the final topcoat won't be done until next spring. Other concerns mentioned at

the meeting included lack of

access to Guelph St. businesses, construction crew vehicles being parked on business property, water

being shut off at various times without notification, safety, and the fact that business owners weren't properly notified of the process

they would have to follow to file a loss of business claim with the town.

"Worker's cars being parked on business property has been an ongoing concern of the town," said Linn. He added town staff or the representative from the town at the site has talked to the contractor several times about that issue.

Linn added notification of water shutoff was not always given and pointed to an example when the water was shut off by mistake at Barrager's Cleaners instead of at a

neighboring location. Mike McHale of HaltAlarm Systems Inc. was concerned about safety. "There have

been no lights for caution at night. The town should take the responsibility to be out there on an ongoing basis," commented McHale.

Linn said an inspector working for the town has been on the site all the time since

the project began. Linn added the construction project has been progressing quickly and six months is not a long time for the completion of the Guelph St. work.

McHale said local firms should be hired to do future work, even if it is going to cost the town more money.


"No local contractors bid for this job. I don't think there were any qualified in town to bid on this job," said Linn.
