Police say the woman was unable to call for an ambulance so her daughter dialed 911 at about 7:30 a.m. and gave the proper information to a dispatcher. The 33-year-old woman was taken to the hospital where she was treated and released.

Break-in investigated



Police nab young offenders after armed robbery

Two male youths, aged 14 and 15, are facing a number of criminal charges including using a firearm in the commission of an offense, in conjunction with a robbery that occurred at Acton's Lakeview Variety Store Tuesday.

Police say at about 9:30 p.m. Tuesday two males entered the store at 126 Main St. N. in Acton. One of

the suspects produced a handgun and demanded cash. Police say the suspects took an undisclosed amount of cash, then fled the area.

Police arrived and established the perimeters where the suspects were last seen then began searching the area. One suspect was caught by the officers and the other suspect was apprehended later in the area

after being located by a member of the service's Tactical Rescue Unit and Peel's Canine Unit. A weapon was also recovered.

The youths were charged with robbery, wearing a disguise, using a firearm in the commission of an offense, pointing a firearm and breach of probation. They were held for a bail hearing Wednesday.
