

Back to school?

Halton Board of Education trustees are going back to school for a formal education in how to conduct themselves a the board table.

At a January board meeting, trustees agreed to spend \$1,000 to train trustees in parliamentary procedures, something often lacking at the board, according to Burlington trustee Diane Leblovic who introduced the motion at the board.

What prompted her action, said Leblovic, were several procedural infractions which she felt "trampled" peoples' rights. The idea is "not to obstruct debate, but facilitate it," she added.

Burlington trustee Linda Glover felt the training workshop was "poor timing" when budgets are being slashed and the board is nearing the end of its term.

The cost for the workshop will be charged to the PD conference account of trustees, said superintendent of Business Services, Jerry Jenkins.

Urban Structure Review

Recommendations concern developers

The Halton Hills 401/Steeles Corridor Development Association is concerned about some of the recommendations in the latest report of the Halton Urban Structure Review.

Hugh Thompson, the association's planning consultant told Halton council Monday night, the group is pleased their lands, which border the 401 along Steeles Ave., have been included in the report for industrial development, but are not pleased with the length of time they may have to wait to see that development.

Thompson said the report stipulates the lands be protected and steps be taken to prevent premature development.

"It says the lands can only be developed once at least 50 per cent of the designated Milton urban area

is developed," said Thompson. "Does this mean we (the association members) will have to wait 25 or 30 years?"

"Is this a Milton plan, or will it include Halton Hills," asked Thompson.

Thompson said the association members also feel they will be the last, according to the review, to get servicing.

Thompson requested a strong joint position from council to be presented to the region.

Town planning director Ian Keith said he would be back at this Monday's council meeting with a staff report on the latest report of the Halton Urban Structure Review.

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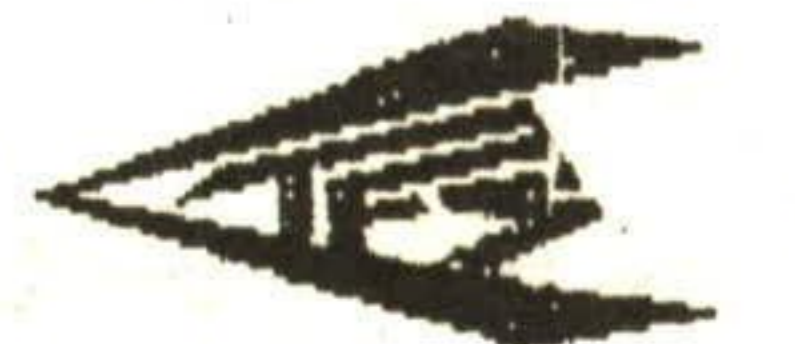
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
