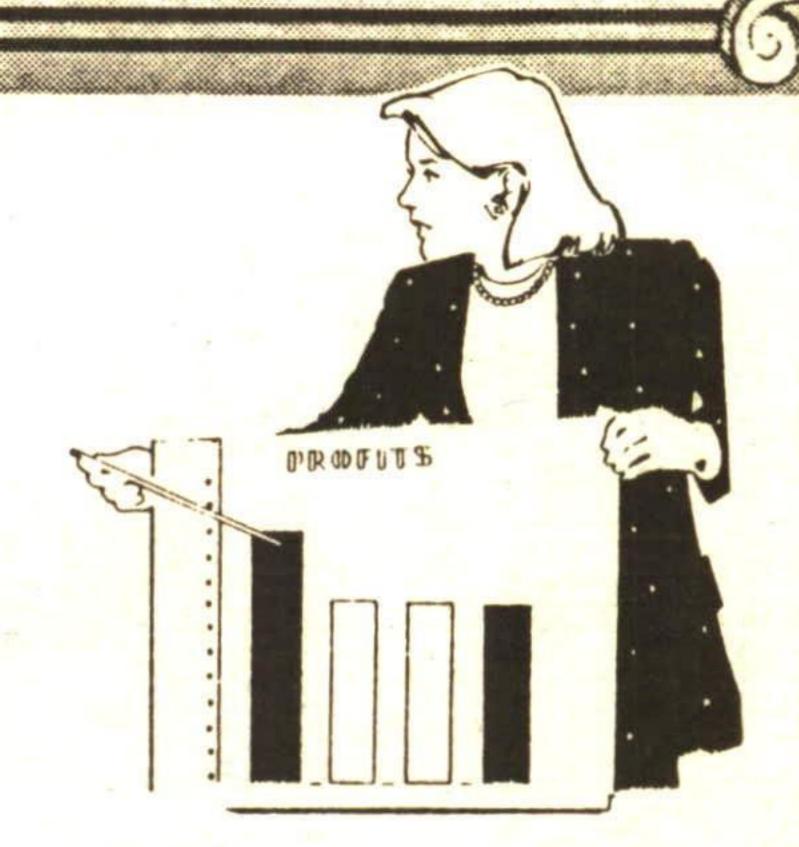

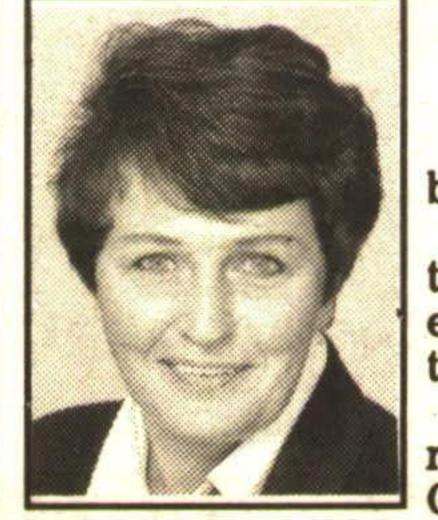
She explains that community response has been very good and that "understanding your customers' needs" is vital for success. With help from younger sister Robyn Miller, HollyHocks is a real family
