Finance group vetoes all day kindergarten

It was an issue that united the entire region and when the people spoke, trustees listened.

That, believes parent Nancy Batchelor, was the reason why the finance committee of the Halton Board of Education vetoed the proposed alternate day, full day kindergarten program at a meeting Monday night. The proposal - part of a five-feature budget cut proposal — would have saved the board \$67,400 this year and more than \$200,000 annually but its life was short-lived.

"It united the communities as a whole. It wasn't a regional thing; it was an entire community thing and don't think they've ever had that before," said Batchelor. "We're making a statement here that yes, we do care about these children."

There was one dissenting vote among trustees Monday night and that was Burlington's Marg Bullock who said she believed it was easier for parents to organize day care for their children on alternate full days, a point disputed by parents.

"We have proven it was the exact opposite," said Batchelor.

The amount of dollars saved with a switch to alternate day, full day kindergarten was "insignificant" compared to the amount of disruption the move would cause in people's lives said Oakville trustee Cheryl Reid.

Other trustees expressed concern about the lack of research and the lack of time to absorb the program change and peruse a curricu-

Oakville trustee Debbie Marklew said the issue shouldn't even be considered because of the uncertainty surrounding implementation of junior kindergarten, a program the board doesn't want but it's a Ministry of Education directive it must fulfill.

"I don't think the proper homework was done...and it's too late (to be implementing this proposal) for this year," said Burlington trustee Noel Cooper.

Board vice-chairman Don Cassidy reminded parents the consequences of this proposal being overruled and others like it, would be an increase in their taxes and he assumed their outcry reflected a 'tolerance' of that.

Cassidy, who voted against the proposal, said he did so because there was no educational advantage and the proposal was not "remote from the classroom" which was one of the criteria supposed to be used by administration in preparing budget cut recommendations.

Oakville trustee John Scheel called the administrations' "little list" of five items, which includes the cancellation of the Bronte Creek outdoor program and cancellation of transportation for secondary school students south of Hwy. 5, "Mickey Mouse items, Woolworth's bunch of proposals."

Scheel's list of budget cut proposals, which he deems will save the board millions and which focuses on the areas of PTR (Pupil Teacher Ratio), transportation, department heads and low attendance courses, will be discussed at the finance committee meeting Feb. 28th. The committee will also vote on the secondary school busing cut.




