Rebels miss second chance to claim Halton crown

Controversy over regional high school sporting regulations proved to be the attention grabber of the week as the Georgetown Rebels girls volleyball teams made their drive towards a pair of Halton Championship titles.

After the Halton finals Tuesday afternoon at Sheridan College in Oakville, which saw the juniors take down the Notre Dame Fighting Irish 2-1 and the seniors fall to the Oakville Trafalgar Red Devils 2-0, senior head coach Bevin Clark logged a formal protest over the use of referees inside the region.

Under the Halton Board of Education rules, referees from outside the region must be used for all championship games.

Clark immediately wrote his protest out following his team's loss Tuesday afternoon and met with

Board officials early Thursday morning. His protest was upheld and the game was rescheduled for Thursday afternoon at 4:30 at Aldershot High School in Burlington.

The rematch didn't go Georgetown's way. After an hour long delay on Oakville Trafalgar's part, the Rebels were taken down once again - this time in a 2-1 match loss.

Thursday evening the Rebels posted an early lead in game one but gave up 11 unanswered points to the Devils and went down 15-8. Game two saw Georgetown fight back for a 15-11 come-from-behind victory of their own.

However, it just wasn't meant to be for the Rebels this season as they went down 15-6 in the third game to end their season, and their hopes for a trip to OFSAA.

Two days earlier, the senior Rebels lost 2-0 to OT in straight 1614 decision. Erinn Steringa led the way for her squad in both matches with great defense and exciting spiking action.

Jenn Murray and Carrie Schenk also provided some heavy hitting

while Kim Wiltshire, Deanne Guignard and Stephanie O'Brien all had strong efforts on the court.

"They (OT) played two strong matches, I'll give them that," said head coach Bevin Clark.

While a formal protest could have been logged for the junior game as well, Notre Dame's coaching staff chose not to replay the championship match.

The junior Rebels brought home the Halton crown after a four-year absence in Georgetown. While the Irish fought back with a 16-14 win in game two, the Rebels never strayed from their game plan and scored the victory.

Replacement Haley Brown proved to be the big star in the third game. Brown came in and blew two ace serves past Notre Dame defenders and collected five points for Georgetown with some devastating spikes that sent Georgetown fans into a frenzy.

The Rebels scored a 15-10 win in the opening contest.

Shannon Nolan and Julie Bottomley turned in great defense and solid hitting in the opening game, with Nolan serving up her team's final point for the win.

Allison Lewis and Brigitte Campbell also provided strong spiking action while Courtney O'Brien was the most effective server Tuesday. Tanya Osborne was also hot with some big digs and Susie Jones came in during game three and made some big plays as well.

"Wow, those were three very close games today (Tuesday). We had heard Notre Dame was a scrappy team and they lived up to their reputation. However, we made less mistakes than they did and were able to score the win," explained junior Rebels head coach Fred Kotani.

Assistant Shirley White added "We were able to stick to our game plan, even after the loss in game two. It's sure nice to bring the title back to Georgetown after four

Both teams finished the regular season with perfect 8-0 records.




Taking 7 medals out of a possible

The next mining expedition is the Master-Bantam Championships this week.


