



Fire officials planning fire prevention program

If local fire officials have their way, children across Halton will be taking a break from the three Rs to learn about fire prevention.

Fire prevention officers appeared before the Halton Roman Catholic School Board recently to provide information on the Learn Not To Burn program.

In an interview prior to the meeting, Art McGlynn of the Burlington fire department was enthusiastic about the program's

"The intent is to have it in all Halton separate schools starting in September 1994," said McGlynn, Burlington's chief fire prevention officer. "Following that, we hope to implement it in public schools."

He said separate school board officials and trustees seem strongly supportive about the free program, and he's confident it will be fully implemented next fall.

Learn Not To Burn was introduced to preschoolers last year, and currently, the program's resource books are being piloted at four Halton separate schools.

The program teaches children how to prevent fires, and also stresses the importance of smoke alarms and fire escape planning.

Twenty-two fire safety behaviors that are key to fire survival and fire and burn prevention, are taught to students.

A curriculum for Learn Not to Burn is being organized into three levels, spanning Kindergarten through Grade 8.

The Level One program (Kindergarten to Grade 2) will be made available, cost free to participating schools for three years.

The next two levels will be phased in, subject to joint fire service, school board and community fund-raising activities.

McGlynn said Canadian Tire Corp. has put up \$800,000 to fund the program resource books used across the country.

The fire prevention officer said the program has been very extensivly tested in the United States, where it originated.

"It's the kind of program where a teacher can take the resource books, and pretty much teach it on her own," he said.

About 10 lessons would be required to teach the program, and one visit from a firefighter would be helpful, said McGlynn.

"This program could be implemented as part of the school health program," he said.

In a background report, program supporters noted that Canada has one of the worst fire loss records among industrialized countries. Each year, more than 500 people die in fires across the country, and about 2,000 more are injured.

The board received a presentation on the matter as an information item.
