Harding honored at retirement dinner

James Harding was showered with gifts at a retirement party and praised as an outstanding, progressive police leader - one of Ontario's finest.

Harding, 59, was honored April 8 for his 14 years as chief of the Halton Regional Police Service.

"Jim, through your efforts you have moved policing forward into a new era," said Barry Quinn, a Burlington councillor and chair of the board overseeing Halton police."You have exercised a leader-ship which we have come to respect and admire."

About 370 police employees, politicians, judges, lawyers and other community members turned out for the \$35-a-plate dinner at Le Dome Banquet Hall on the North Service Road East.

Harding, a Burlington resident, retired from a 38-year police career December 31. He has since begun a new job as head of investigative services for the province's Special Investigations Unit, which probes shootings by police.

At his retirement party, 17 former colleagues, friends and other officials took the podium to speak about Harding's progressive leadership style and innovative contributions to the field of policing. "In almost 30 years of law and justice practice, I've known a great many fine and devoted police officers of all ranks," said Clare Lewis, the province's former police complaints commissioner who will soon head up the new Ontario Gaming Control Commission. "None have exceeded Jim Harding as an exam-

ple of the best that policing has to offer."

Harding was a member of a provincial task force on race relations and policing which was chaired by Lewis in 1988 and reconvened in 1992.

Harding, who later rose to the podium, asked his wife to stand by his side as he thanked friends and his former staff for his years on the force

"In all the years that we have been together, she has been my right arm, she has been my conscience, she has been my guide..." he said of his wife.

Harding said he felt "overwhelmed" and "humbled" by the presence of so many people at his retirement party.

"I'm almost at a loss for words - almost - but not quite," joked Harding, who is well known for never running short of words.

Retirement gifts to Harding, whose three children attended the dinner, included plaques, a Napoleon figurine, a Halton police ceremonial sword and radar for his prized 36-foot wooden power boat.

Harding and his wife, both from Wales, and others at the event were entertained by the Halton Regional Police Chorus, which performed a Welsh melody entitled All Through the Night. Harding formed the chorus in 1984.
