Joseph Gibbons School hosts region-wide chess tourney


The annual Halton Junior Chess Tournament was held at Joseph Gibbons School on April 12.


Several jumps are now available and if there is serious interest, a proper course will be set up. The present viewing room will be converted to comfortable lounge and private tack room for boarders.


