
break.







THE WEATHER AND HOW IT AFFECTS YOUR LAWN

The temperature and weather conditions play an intricate part in the health and condition of home lawns. Even the geographical location makes a difference, e.g., Acton versus Georgetown.

The extremely cold temperatures this spring have delayed the germination of weeds and spring green up by up to 2-1/2 weeks. Now that the temperature appears to be maintaining itself, the lawns and flowers are all starting to grow. The rain so far this year has been great for your garden and lawn. Once again people are having to cut their lawns more than once per week.

Winter damage has been very dominant this spring because of the very cold winter we just had. It has made it very difficult for some lawns to green up because of the dead grass. Giving your lawn a good raking will definitely help this situation.

As springtime progresses, the cool nights have left lawn diseases virtually invisible. But don't expect this to last. As soon as the warm temperatures come along, the diseases are certain to arrive.

The wind this spring has been very strong. Although it has helped to dry out your lawn from all of the rain we have had, it has also made it difficult for you to apply your weed control. Weed control products may damage shrubs and flowers if they come in direct contact with the plants. So, if you are going to apply a weed control product to your lawn, be careful of the wind. Treating the lawn in the early morning or evening would be best as there is usually the least amount of wind at this time.
