Councillor Ron Chatten voiced his dissatisfaction Monday night with a report from the town's fire chief regarding his explanation of why a station wagon is required for the fire department instead of a van.

The report was dealt with at last week's committee meeting which included a recommendation to purchase a \$21,000 Mercury Sable station wagon from Park Lincoln Mercury. Committee passed the recommendation at that meeting.

"I felt the report was superficial," said Chatten. "It addressed only the height of underground garages." Chatten said he thought the report would discuss uses of the vehicle, the number of people it would carry, and other details.

He said the reason he requested the chief look into the option of buying a less expensive van was so the town would see a \$5,000 to \$7,000 savings. Chatten added requests set out in the town's

budgets are only guidelines. "I didn't see enough information (in the

Walt Dixon's comments at another meeting that council didn't understand the tendering process Chatten referred to a tender that Park Lincoln submitted to the town in

"It was requested of council, after the tendering process was complete, that it (Park Lincoln's tender) be removed because errors had been made in calculations."

According to Chatten, council of the day agreed to remove the tender. Chatten said he only brought up that incident because "it is a twoway street."

Councillor Norm Elliott stressed the station wagon will not be used by the fire chief as a personal vehicle as suggested by Councillor Rob Heaton at a recent meeting in Glen Williams.

The recommendation to purchase the Sable wagon from Park Lincoln was carried eight to four. Councillors Ron Chatten, Al Cook, Rob Heaton and Gail Rutherford voted against the recommendation.
