People evacuated

Residents on one side of John St. in Georgetown were evacuated from their homes Friday morning. A call came through to the Halton Hills Fire Department at about 10 a.m. that there was a gas odor and the problem was later found to be a chemical in a storage shed across from the apartment building at 115 John St. At 2 p.m. firefighters were still busy with this call.

Kitchen fire

About \$1,500 damage was caused to a Park Ave. apartment when some cooking oil was left on the stove, Thursday. The Fire Department was called at 11 p.m. The cupboards and drywall was damaged.

Serious accident

Two people were taken by ambulance to Georgetown Hospital Thursday night. A Toyota driven by a Georgetown resident hit a tree stump on King St. and Mountainview Rd. at 11:20 p.m., police said. No futher details were available.

Closed for the season

The Civic Centre may be closed the week between Christmas and New Year's Day this year. The closure is not required as part of social contract requirements, as it was in 1993, but because it makes good business sense. Town administrator Ray King said since demand for administrative services is down during that period, closing will result in cost savings and boost employee morale. The recommendation has to be adopted by council.

Severe damage

A 1986 Buick was severely damaged when the accelerator jammed Monday. The driver was reversing out of a parking spot on Guelph St. when the car spun backwards out of control, hitting the curb, then an island and landed on top of some shrubs. No charges were laid.

IUVVII ICVCAIS Acton arena site preference

Acton residents are one step closer to having a new arena and community centre.

At the committee meeting Monday night committee passed a recommendation that gave town staff the go-ahead to present an option to purchase an eightacre parcel of land in Acton on the north side of Hwy. between the high school and the highway (on the proposed Rinarin lands).

The recommendation has to receive council approval before it is official however, likely at next week's

meeting. Tom Shepard, director of the town's Recreation and Parks department, said the option to purchase sends a message to the owner of the land that the town is serious in its intention to buy the land.

The option was initiated by


the town.

Shepard said the purchase option, if it is accepted, will TOM SHEPARD give the town flexibility to not go ahead with the offer if full development doesn't take place in Acton, or to perhaps build on a different

site. The Acton development issue is currently before the Ontario Municipal Board and studies are being done to determine whether fish in Black Creek will be harmed by the water requirements of

increased population. Shepard added the option to purchase doesn't yet put the town in the position to begin applying for grants for the arena and community centre, as a site has to be secured before those applications can be made. Town staff has been working on the project for

some time now however.

Acton councillor Rick Bonnette was very pleased the recommendation was passed.

"This is the first step," said Bonnette. He added it has been a very long time coming.

The amount of money to be offered to purchase the land was not disclosed publicly at the meeting, but \$200,000 was earmarked in the 1994 budget.

Guns turned in
