# Senior officers get new contract

Senior Halton police officers and civilians finally have a contract for last year.

Officials signed a 1993 contract at a recent meeting of the Halton Regional Police Services Board.

The contract is retroactive to January 1, 1993 and covers wages, salaries and working conditions for the 17 members of the Halton Regional Police Senior Officers Association.

The association includes nine police officers with ranks of inspector and superintendent as well as eight civilians.

Inspector Tony Repa said the contract, which expired last December 31, doesn't include any salary increases because wages are frozen until March 1996 under the provinces's Social Contract.

However, the contract provides some improvements in benefits to the spouses of deceased retired members, Insp. Repa said.

"It's a good contract given the economic climate."

Insp. Repa said the contract also includes some minor changes in wording and phrases. "It (contract) was just house cleaning."

His association hasn't yet begun bargaining sessions for its 1994 contract, he said.

Paul LaCourse, administrator of the Halton Regional Police Association, said his association representing 520 police and civilians signed its 1993 contracts last March.


