BROWN SPOTS AND PYTHIUM BLIGHT

I am currently receiving 2-3 calls each day regarding "bronze coloured brown spots" on lawns. I have seen these same "brown spots" on lawns all over Halton Hills in the past 2

In the middle of June we experienced unusually hot, humid weather, which brought on a lawn disease called Pythium Blight. It is most noticeable in the early mornings when heavy dews are formed overnight and when daytime temperatures are humid and above 30C. As the grass blades dry up during the day, the dead blades turn to a reddish brown, leaving you with a "polka dot" like appearance on your lawn. Pythium Blight is most commonly found in very dry, sunny areas (ie: near side walks/driveways) and in lawns with excessive thatch. It is very difficult to control Pythium Blight in a home lawn because of the speed at which it develops (it has been known to devastate lawns within 24 hours). The best control for this

Provide adequate water (1-1/2" per week) but avoid light frequent waterings.

Adequate drainage is essential.

Fertilize your lawn with a well balanced fertilizer (do not over feed with nitrogen). Mow and water your lawn between 9:00 AM and 12:00 PM. Mowing and watering in the early morning or evening will spread the disease through your lawn.

5. Keep your lawn mower blade very sharp.

Now that the weather has cooled down and we have had some rain the disease has stopped damaging lawns and the affected areas have started to recover. I have found that watering your lawn at the proper time is the most effective way to rejuvenate the damaged grass. In most cases the affected areas should completely recover in 2-3 weeks, however in severely damaged areas some seeding may be needed.
