Dunleavy living out a sports enthusiasts dream

Dan Dunleavy says he's "just one of the guys." Well, Dunleavy is living out the dream of many of them.

The 28-year-old Georgetown native is an on-air personality at Toronto's, and Canada's only, all-sports radio station, The Fan 1430.

"I go to work and I get to talk about what happened in game seven of the Stanley Cup playoffs and what I think of it and why I think such a thing happened," he says.

His description is enough to send the heart of every armchair quarterback between Georgetown and Georgia fluttering.

However, giving opinions is just one small part of Dunleavy's duties at the Fan. In baseball parlance, you'd call him the station's pinch-hitter or, if you're defensively inclined, its utility man.

From doing traffic on the morning show to reading sports updates to hosting phone-in segments to conducting interviews to covering Blue Jay games, Dunleavy does it all. "Versatile" could very well be his nickname.

It's a possible moniker that can be traced all the way back to 1986.

At the time, Dunleavy was a radio and television arts student at Niagara College in Welland.

Once he graduated from the three year program at Niagara, he went to work at Orangeville's DC 103, a 50,000 watt station which had gone on the air just a month before he arrived.

His initial duties consisted of taking news from the weekend papers and rewriting it for the weekday newscasters. Those in journalism call it scalping.

"I got paid 20 bucks a day. So I got basically gas money to go all the way up to Orangeville. I was still living in Georgetown at the time," he recalls.

From that humble behind the scenes beginning, Dunleavy worked his way to sports director and newscaster.

"It was great a great experience and nice to work in a small town like that. I'm not in the business to be well-known — far from it.

I'm just happy to be paid doing what I'm doing, but it was kind of neat to have people know who you were. It made you feel good," he says.

The name recognition has only increased since Dunleavy made the switch to the Fan more than a year ago. His anonymity, what little he has left, could be forever lost if Dunleavy decides to pursue a career in television journalism.

"I'm not out looking for one right now. Maybe when it comes time for a new challenge to present

itself, but right now I've got my hands full with becoming even more comfortable with what I'm doing at the Fan."

The comfort factor is important to Dunleavy. After all, he used the same reasoning to postpone his entry into the Toronto

media jungle. He decided he was ready in early 1993 and,

as it turned out, Hogtown was more than ready for him. In fact, two stations, the Fan and 680 News, both wanted his services.


After weighing the options, Dunleavy decided he'd rather gab about South Korean soccer results than North Korean nuclear threats. It was all-sports over all-news.

"My goal was to get paid to talk about sports and to get paid well enough."

Now that he's met that goal, Dunleavy has his eyes set on another. He'd love to get the opportunity to do some play-by-play.

But if the opportunity doesn't materialize, Dunleavy won't consider it a setback. He'll still be be having a good time doing what he's doing now.

As a post-script, Dunleavy, a very experienced soccer player, says he's looking to get a few kicks with an inter-county team. Interested teams should contact the former Georgetown Falcon at the radio station.


U.S. tourney


Two other Georgetown residents, Katie Blyth and Marci Roy, play for Brampton.
