



Watermain upgrades planned for Halton

Halton residents connected to municipal water services, will likely pay 1.5 cents more per day about \$5 per year — on their 1995 water bills for watermain upgrades to ensure proper fire protection.

The accelerated program of upgrades for substandard, 100mm (4-inch) cast iron watermains, comes in the wake of a Burlington fire this spring in which firefighters couldn't get sufficient water from hydrants to fight a blaze.

The inadequate watermains are mainly in older areas of Halton.

"Present (water) users aren't paying enough. They're getting a real bargain in water and sewer," Halton region's public works director Art Leitch told planning and public works committee members Wednesday.

"It's not inappropriate for the existing ratepayers to pay for rehabilitation of the system," said Leitch. Average water customers use 890 litres per day; "a lot of water, he said, at a cost of less than \$1 per day.

"We're talking one-and-a-half cents per day to improve the water system and fire protection in Halton Region. I don't think it's an unreasonable increase," he said.

Council will look at the issue next week, however Oakville councillor Stephen Sparling said, "we have no choice." He noted the water

rate increase will be examined with a view to alternative financing methods during September budget discussions.

However, Leitch said it's unlikely the region will fund additional funds to bear the brunt of the cost.

That cost is \$4.6 million for the five-year replacement project. About \$700,000 will come from regional reserve, with the remaining money from a debenture.

Halton Region has a program for substandard watermain replacement. The program is married to municipal road reconstruction. Based on council concerns arising from the Burlington fire, however, it will be stepped up.

Originally it would have taken 15 years to complete. It's now expected to be done within three years.

Testing of flows in the area of the 100 mm watermains resulted in 23 hydrants being taken out of service. Residents of Oakville and Burlington near the out-of-service hydrants have been informed, by letter, receiving assurances of adequate fire protection to their homes.

Only three hydrants were taken out of service in Halton Hills, and only one in Milton.

Other hydrants that were left in service but produce low water flows will have their bonnets painted white to indicate the low flow situa-


