# Local couple swings to Ontario Senior Games

The Georgetown husband and wife duo of Bill and Norma Maynard, both 64, have qualified to compete at the Ontario Senior Games, being held in Sudbury Aug. 22-24.

However, the Maynards are not competing in the same sport. Bill will be teeing off in the golf event, while Norma will be serving up aces in the tennis tourney.

"I think it's probably the first time that we've had it (husband and wife qualifying in two different sports) in our district," said Pat Giguere, Senior Games co-ordinator for District 21, comprised of Halton Hills, Milton, Oakville and Burlington.

"We've had couples before, but they were in the same sport,"

Giguere said.

Norma and her partner, Mike Marshall, qualified by finishing second in the district's mixed doubles tourney. The tourney winners, Georgetown's Frank Kimantas and June Lewis, were supposed to be the district's representatives, but they have opted not to attend the Games.

"It (learning that she would be going to Sudbury) was a surprise," said Norma, who is the president of the Gordon Alcott Tennis Club.

Bill Maynard was motivated by his wife's unexpected qualification.

"I thought if Norma's going, I would go with her," he said.

True to his word, he went out and shot a net score of 72 at Acton Meadows to capture the district men's golf title.

Now, the two are eagerly looking forward to Sudbury. They lived in the city in the late seventies and one of their three sons still resides there.

As a souvenir, they plan to bring home some gold, silver or bronze from the Big Nickel.

"I don't know what we're up against, but we're gonna wipe them out," predicted Norma in her best Joe Namath imitation.

In addition to the Maynards and Marshall, eleven other Halton Hills residents will compete in Sudbury.

They are: Bill Lawrence (men's golf); Elsie Whitham, Gertrude Shortill and Sandra Timleck (ladies' golf); Mary Kately and Neila Mowat (cribbage); Shell Lawr and Tony Suchan (horseshoes); Ken Howat (3-km walk); Shirley McKewon and Joyce Tilson (five-pin bowling).

As district co-ordinator, Giguere will also attend the Games.

Two other local residents qualified for the Games but, like Kimantas and Lewis, have decided not to attend. They are Archie Lawr (horseshoes) and Mary Greenway (swimming)
