

A 34-year-old City of Guelph police officer was arrested at her Oakville residence Wednesday night after an incident at a Milton women's shelter Friday.


Halton Regional Police said woman went to the shelter at 8:45 a.m. Friday under the guise of needing help.

Seniors get funding for new centres

It was a happy day for seniors in Halton Hills Wednesday, when Halton North MPP Noel Duignan made the announcement that they had waited years to hear.

The Ministry of Health is granting \$30,000 annually to each seniors centre in Acton and Georgetown to help cover operating costs. This announcement means both communities will have temporary facilities up and running before the end of the year.

"I thank God for bestowing this blessing on Halton Hills," Les Mellish, president of the Georgetown Seniors Association said. "I believe He intended it would happen, and I believe He intended to teach us patience."

Mellish said he felt like crying at hearing the good news because he had been "laying on a bed of nails for a week," knowing that the announcement was coming but unable to breathe a word to a soul. The meeting at the Civic Centre to make the announcement was hastily organized Tuesday.

The Georgetown centre will set up their temporary facility at The Indoor Mall on Guelph St., and began meeting Friday to finalize the floor plan.

An unexpected bonus is that the grant is for the fiscal year starting April 1, 1994, which gives the seniors committees a little extra money to help cover the costs of renovating and furnishing the new centres, said councillor Gerald Rennie, who is also the chairman of the Acton Seniors Recreation Centre committee. He said the committee has been up and running since October 1987, a year longer than the Georgetown group.

The Acton seniors centre will likely be in the space formerly occupied by FlightLine on Mill St., but they haven't come up with a final deal yet. Rennie hopes the new facility might be open by the end of the year. He said Acton seniors have raised \$40,000 over the years to help pay for renovations and setup costs, and it also has a \$20,000 New Horizons grant which can be used for this purpose.
