Georgetown's Gord Buchan got his American collegiate tennis career off to a good start this past year and he's looking forward to bigger and better things in the future.



Huntington College, located in Huntington, Indiana, captured its NAIA conference title and then placed 18th at the national championships.

"We had a decent season against the rest of the teams in our conference," said Buchan, summing up the team's performance.

As for his own performance, the former Georgetown District High School star says that, at first, he was hampered by a lack of experience.

"I found that they (his teammates

Even without the match toughness that comes with experience, the Huntington College coaching staff was pleased with Buchan's play in his freshman campaign.

"This has been Huntington College's most successful season," said tennis coach Mark Fairchild. "Gord was a big part of our success."

Buchan, a business management major, hopes to continue that success in his sophomore year.

"I'm looking forward to it and I on expect our team to do just as well or bet-

ter," he said.
