Tavern owner dies after fall

A man who recently bought the Hollywood Tavern with his son, fell off a ladder in the building and died Tuesday.

Frank Vranich, 69, a resident of Stoney Creek, was dropped off by his daughter-in-law, Marilyn Vranich, and grandson earlier in the day in order to do some work on the building, Det. Sgt. Ron Welsh said.

Marilyn Vranich saw her father-in-law at 4 p.m. and then returned to pick him up at 8:30

p.m., and he was found unconscious on the floor.

He was taken by ambulance to Georgetown Hospital and never regained consciousness, Welsh said.

The investigation revealed that he had been working on the floor joists to support the upper floor when he fell off the ladder. He hit his head on the concrete floor, which caused serious

injuries, resulting in his death. Vranich's son John (the

Tavern co-owner) and daughterin-law are in the process of moving into a residence on McKinnon Ave. in Georgetown, Welsh said.

A Norval resident who didn't want to be identified said the family had been working very hard over the past months to refurbish the Hollywood so that it could be reopened.

The Hollywood has been closed since it was gutted by a fire on June 27, 1993.



Financial boost for Hide House

The olde Hide House received an infusion of \$2-million this week.

The company, which had to close the operation and refinance 14 months ago, has paid its debts and has "several hundred thousand dollars" to use as working capital, according to president Steve Dawkins.

The investment has come from Working Ventures Canadian Fund Inc., a publicly-traded mutual fund which is sponsored by the Canadian Federation of Labor. Working Ventures has over \$290 million to invest in small and mediumsized Canadian companies.

The announcement of the investment was made Thursday and Dawkins said the television commercials, declaring that "it's worth the drive to Acton," started airing again Wednesday night.

Dawkins said he is "extremely pleased and excited" about the investment, not only because of the additional funds, but also because it means a "ratification of the company and also the future of the community."

The \$2-million will only be used for the olde Hide House and not Blue Springs Golf Club. FlightLine and West Wearhouse won't be reopening, but Dawkins said the investment money will be used "to fund growth projects in the future," either in Acton or outside of the community.

"For the next year or two we'll likely be trying to rebuild the franchise that has dissipated over the last few years, the olde Hide House," he said.

The business had to close in June 1993, and then reopened that fall, but was only open on weekends.

An independent management group with strong connections to the Hide House will be reopening Jack Tanner's Table on Wednesday.
