


Lots to see and do at the CNE

Millions of Ontarians have made at least one visit to the Canadian National Exhibition. For some, the CNE is a fond childhood memory of visit made years ago. For others the Ex remains a summertime ritual flavored with a satisfying mix of the familiar and the unexpected.

Today the CNE is one of the largest annual exhibitions in the world, taking place each summer for 18 days ending on Labor Day. Many people automatically associate the CNE with midway rides, hot dogs and rock concerts. The CNE is those things. But it is also a lot more. Each year it presents a full spectrum of exhibits, musical and other stage performances, athletic events, children's activities and the list goes on.

This year the Ex opened Friday and runs through September 5. In addition to the traditional favorites, visitors can expect to enjoy the highlights like the Fiesta de Mexico feature country exhibit, Kids' World, the All-Pro Sportsplex, the free Bandshell Concert Series and the CNE Casino.

At Fiesta de Mexico, visitors can experience the vibrant, colorful culture of Mexico. The 50,000 square foot exhibit will include a faithfully replicated tianguis (market place) and zocalo (town square) where the art of jewelry making, paper mache, wood carving and ceramics will be demonstrated and sold. To complete the Fiesta mood, visitors will enjoy strolling Mariachi bands, live dancing, and authentic Mexican cuisine served up at Too



Hot Tamales Cafe y Cantina. Fiesta de Mexico, like all CNE exhibits, is free with CNE admission.

Families will love Kids' World an area of the grounds devoted to the imagination of children. The area will feature the Express Yourself Dome in which kids and parents can experiment with theatre, crafts, music, computer graphics and more. There will be a petting zoo, picnic area, a stage with around the clock entertainment and lots more to keep young kids and their parents entertained for hours.


