Impaired driving

New owner found for Acton Y building

The green light has been given by town council for the sale of the Mill Street YMCA building in Acton.

A recommendation to release the lands owned by the YMCA of Greater Toronto from the town's reversionary interest was passed by Monday evening's council meeting.

The YMCA of Greater Toronto have found a purchaser for the building.

The name of the purchaser, however, would not be released by YMCA (Greater Toronto) vice-president Tom Horlor, who was present at Monday's meeting.

"The sale has not been finalized yet, but we feel that getting council's approval for the release was the final stumbling block and that now the deal will proceed as planned," said Horlor, who stated that the purchaser's plans for the property are as yet not known.

The Acton YMCA was first opened in the 1930s when James A. Murray gave the town \$20,000 as a term of his will that the money be

used to build a Young Men's Christian Association building.

Due to needed repairs in the 1970s, a question was raised as to the ownership of the building.

The issue was finally resolved with the parties entering into an agreement authorized by Bylaw 77-053 and a deed for the land being provided to the YMCA by the town.

The agreement provided for the town to transfer any interest it might have in the lands to the YMCA, with the provision that: "In the event that the YMCA should at some time in the future decide to sell the lands and premises aforesaid, then the YMCA will make application to the town at that time for a release of the town's right of reverter in the lands or for the negotiation of some new arrangement."

Horlor explained that the proceeds of the sale will remain in Acton, to be used by the YMCA to expand and enrich their programming — and not to sustain current operating costs for the Greater Toronto YMCA, which was a concern for several councillors.
