# Pomeroy trial date set for new year

Halton Regional Chair Peter Pomeroy says he's disappointed he won't have a chance to clear his name before the November municipal election.

The first of two trials Pomeroy faces on corruption charges has been set for January 17.

Referring to his reputation, he said, "It's important for me to clear in in any event," outside the courtroom on Thursday (Sept. 1). "Unfortunately, we don't set the agenda."

Pomeroy said he has not yet

decided if he will seek re-appointment as regional chair. The chair is selected by a ballot of the 24 regional councillors subsequent to the fall municipal election. Pomeroy has served in that position since the mid 1980s.

Judge Carnwath told the court he couldn't set the trial dates sooner because of the unavailability of judges, as well as scheduling problems among all parties.

Pomeroy is charged with two counts each of breach of trust and accepting a secret commission.

The charges allege that he took a bribe of \$80,000 and shares in a land development company while holding elected office.

Charges were laid last year after more than two years investigation by Project 80, a joint force police team established to probe allegations of municipal government corruption.
