Feeding the world's hungry

There is a field situated on the west side of Trafalgar Road, south of Ashgrove, where a stand of corn is growing, and that 18-acre plot is destined to feed some of the world's hungry.

Through a group effort, members of the Halton Soil and Crop

Improvement Association, Halton Junior Farmers, a few businesses and individuals cosponsoring the project, and the fruits of the harvest are to be donated to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, a charitable organization dedicated to collecting and distributing food grains to the world's hungry on behalf of Canadian Christian church denomina-

The Trafalgar Rd. site is one of 31 projects across Ontario, the total of which reaches nearly 1,000 acres of crops such

as corn, soybeans, wheat and bar-

Organized Foodgrains Bank originated in the prairies, but has been operating in Ontario for the past four years.

Foodgrains Bank chief executive officer Al Doerksen recently visited the plot, located on the Maple Leaf Research Farm. He travels all over Canada, meeting with those groups donating crops, and viewing the

Ken McNabb, whose farm is located across from the field, has taken an interest as well. He originally rented the land, and approached the landlord to donate the property for the project.

When the harvesting is complet-


ed, the grain (the corn) or proceeds from the sale of the grain, will go directly to feeding the hungry.

"Apparently, the grains are given to some countries as food, while others are used in 'food-forwork' programs in some third world countries," said Ken, "The foodfor-work programs generate work and help boost the local economy in those countries, offering an incentive to work."

Although the crop is presently growing quite nicely, the work is far from finished; the final job remains this fall, when it will be harvested.

"We're looking forward to seeing field combined November)," says Brownridge,
"We're hoping to bring in six or eight big combines all at once, to take off the crop, and have some sort of a celebration."

And no less impressive will be the fact that many hungry people will be fed, through the generosity and efforts of a few local farmers.
