Pomeroy won't seek re-election to Region post

Halton regional chair Peter Pomeroy, amid criticism of taxpayers financing his legal fees under a new regional bylaw, announced Wednesday he won't seek re-election in November, and would step down immediately if council so voted.

Wednesday regional council unanimously voted to revisit the legal fee payback policy. A report will come forward within a month, once outside legal opinions are obtained. Council didn't ask for Pomeroy's resignation.

"I will not be seeking office here in Halton beyond the end of this term," Pomeroy said.

He then made reference to bids by various councillors at the Wednesday meeting aimed at altering the legal fee compensation bylaw. "As well, if I have become such a liability as some of those motions may lead you to believe, if by a majority vote of coun-

cil you feel I should resign, I'll resign at your convenience."

Awaiting trial on charges of criminal breach of trust and accepting a secret commission, Pomeroy said his announcement came earlier than planned.

"I enjoy a fight but I'm getting tired. I would prefer it if council was to look me straight in the eye and vote me out. I'll resign today. You tell me, but please have the decency to debate the merits of the decision publicly."

Declaring conflicts of interest on the legal fee compensation bylaw changes, and a flurry of associated motions, Pomeroy took the podium as a delegation before council saying, "Get your seatbelts on."

Apologizing for councillors having to "suffer through this current malaise that permeates this region," Pomeroy added, "I have never seen anything in my experience to rival what's happening at this time.

The fair is set to close at 4:30 p.m.


False alarms
