Halton Hills could be split in boundary restructuring

The federal riding of Halton-Peel will likely change before the next election, according to MP Julian Reed.

The Federal Electoral Boundaries Commission for the province of Ontario filed its report with the Chief Electoral Officer last week.


Reed said he hasn't seen the report, which is not being released until next month. The last recommendation involved splitting the community of Halton Hills, so that it would become part of two different

Georgetown. Reed doesn't want to see this happen and said the new report might rectify this problem.

The commission held 17 days of hearings across Ontario, and everywhere it heard presentations from people who were not happy with the proposed changes, because communities were being divided.

At the same time, a bill in the Senate might make the entire exercise irrelevant, Reed said. Bill C-18 would suspend the Electoral

ridings, roughly dividing Acton and 22, 1995, and could prevent any changes victory if the boundaries don't change.

from being made before the next federal election.

"This bill is on the front burner so far as we've been told," Reed said, but the Senate doesn't get back in session until October.

"The majority of the Senate (which is dominated by Conservatives) originally wanted to leave things as they were for the next election... We're hopeful that cooler heads will prevail," Reid said. He explained the

Conservatives thought they would Boundaries Readjustment Act until June have a better chance of gaining an election

The current proposal would create six new seats, including two in Ontario. But Reed would prefer to see the parameters changed, so that each MP represents more voters. He said each MP costs about \$500,000 annually and adding six new representatives would add to the budget problems. In Canada one MP represents roughly 100,000 voters, but in Australia each elected official represents about 200,000 members.

"I don't think Australia is served any less-well than Canada," he said, but the costs are far less. In addition, Parliament Hill is becoming a crowded place, and Reed said there is no room for more politicians.

could get even break

Beginning next year Halton Hills residents should be able to pay their realty taxes with equal monthly payments.

At the committee meeting Monday night committee authorized town staff to prepare a bylaw for council's approval to introduce the pre-authorized tax payment plan.

In his report to council town treasurer Andy Koopmans said due to the installation of the new auto-administrator computer in the finance department, improved software allows the town to offer improved service.

Under the proposed pre-authorized plan staff recommended the implementation of three types of plans, 10 installments for realty taxes, four installments for realty and business taxes, and a pre-authorized payroll deduction plan for town employees.

For those on the 10 installment plan the payment due for the month will be automatically deducted from the taxpayer's bank account.

Those on the four installment plan will also have the funds automatically withdrawn from their account, but only four times a year, on the due dates stipulated on the tax bills they receive.

"It is an easy method for ratepayers to make recurring payments without the necessity of cheque writing and meeting the forever rising costs of postage or the embarrassment of missed payments due to vacations etc.," said Koopmans.

He added people won't be allowed to participate in the plan unless their taxes are current.

Council is expected to pass the plan recommendation Monday.



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
