

Battle for hydro post in Ward 4

Halton Hills voters had the chance to hear from the two candidates vying for the Ward 4 hydro commissioner job at the All

Candidates Day Sunday afternoon.
The Ward 4 race between Bill Smith and Russ Miller is the only one in the town as all other commissioners been acclaimed; Dobbie Frizzel in Ward 1, Murt Allison in Ward 2 and Jim Fisher in Ward 3.

In his opening remarks incumbent Bill Smith outlined his political background including his three years as mayor of Georgetown.

He said he played an active role in the cohesive amalgamation of Georgetown and Halton Hills Hydro. He pointed to cost cutting measures taking by the commission and to the fact his expenses have been the lowest on the commission.

Smith said to cut costs only two commissioners should attend functions and seminars. As in the past Smith believes strongly the GST should be removed from the cost of hydro because it as an essential service.

"I find it quite strange Russ and are running

against each said other," Smith.

"I will continue to represent you as I have for the past 30 years,' said Miller, current mayor of the town, in his introductory speech. He said he will be responsible, accessible, approachable and use fiscal restraint.

Miller added he has always had an open door policy in the past and will continue to

in the future. Both candi-

asked why they believe they are the better one for the commissioner's position.

Miller referred to his experience and leadership. Smith referred to his 21 years experience on the utility, his enthusiasm and energy.

They were also asked if convention expenses for commissioners should be paid for by ratepayers. Smith said some conventions are

beneficial. "Too much money is being spent

recklessly at this level and should be reduced," said Smith. "In the past too much money

was spent at conventions however that has improved dramatically," said Miller.


In Wednesday's edition of the Independent/Free Press Molly Monahan was incorrectly quoted as saying the town's commercial and residential tax base needs to be strengthened.
