Bell Canada provides Actonians with ESA service

Acton residents looking for a Guelph telephone number can call Bell directory assistance, 411, without the fear of being charged for the number.

Perry Blocher, communications manager for Bell Canada said, "Acton has been provided with Extended Service Area (ESA). Acton is listed in the Halton directory, and Guelph is listed in the Region of Waterloo."

Blocher said since Acton is pro-

vided with ESA, and the two areas are not long distance and in different directories, then Acton residents will not be billed for 411 numbers.

Blocher said listed in the front of the Bell Telephone Book are the Guelph exchanges which Acton can call without incurring long distance charges. The Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commis-sion (CRTC) stipulates that in order for Acton to remain sanctioned ESA, "community of

interest," must be shown and, o "requires that at least 60 per cent of customers in one exchange call the other exchange at least once a month in any two months in a 12- 0 month consecutive period."

Lisa Ellsmere, public affairs Q officer said Bell will not automatically send out a Guelph area phone books to Acton residents, but if they phone Bell's business office and > request a directory, one will be Q

Not only does the denturist (Denture Therapist) provide a full range of denture services directly to the patient, but he provides this service at a cost that make wearing dentures possible for many who could not otherwise afford them. There are currently nine provinces and one territory in Canada where this service is possible. Besides Ontario, denturists in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and the Yukon Territory also have the same right to serve the general public. You do not need a referral from your denturist. Simply call our office direct. -
