advised by Olympic athlete Silvia Ruegger recently.

The Guelph resident and marathon champion participated in the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles and hopes to represent Canada again

"Few of us are as brave as our dreams. A lot of us have dreams or goals of what we would like to be, but we hold back," she said.

Ruegger decided she wanted to represent Canada in the Olympics even before she entered high school, but didn't tell anyone about this goal because she was afraid of failure. Instead in September1976 she wrote her goal on a piece of paper, which she hid in the floor of her bedroom when she was still in Grade 7.

Ruegger encouraged the students not to hold back, not to let doubts overcome them or circumstances intervene.

The Olympic runner said she has had plenty of self-doubts throughout her career. Now she has to battle a voice which tells her she is too old, whereas in Grade 7 and 8 she was the only girl on the cross country team and had to deal with jokes which some-

times hurt. As well, numerous sports injuries kept her from running. When she was at the

University of Guelph, she wasn't able to run for two and a half years, but she found other ways to train and eventually started to run again, not long before the 1988 Olympics.

The women's marathon in the 1988 Olympics was only her second marathon.

"It was the first time in the Olympic Games that women were allowed to run more than 1,500 meters, which is less than a mile. Until then, they thought it was too much for a woman, we couldn't do


it," she said. Ruegger came in eighth place and set the best time for a Canadian marathon runner, a record she broke five months later.

"I was able to say I had done the very best I could. That is the highest reward," she said.

Seven months after the Olympics Ruegger was in a head-on collision, and wasn't able to race for another two and a half years. She has had lots of disappointments, but now hopes to make the 1996 Olympic team.

"I want to challenge each of you to have a goal or dream. I would have never made it on talent alone, it also takes commitment day in, day out," she said. "It takes courage. Terry Fox was told he was crazy, but he had a dream and he had the courage to do it. Millions of people have benefited from that."

Ruegger showed eight minutes of her 1988 Olympic race to the students, and also brought some mementos of her career over the years.

The distinction follows a first-place showing at last weekend's Payne Clothing Classic in Mississauga where they beat the powerhouse Erindale team 2-0 in the finals.






