Norval prepares to celebrate A Montgomery Christmas

Norval is celebrating A Montgomery Christmas on Dec. 3 and 4 and everyone is invited to come and take a browse through the hamlet which was once home to the famous author of *Anne of Green Gables*, Lucy Maud Montgomery. "Norval is so beautiful now that it takes my breath," she wrote in *The Selected Journals of L. M. Montgomery*, Vol. III. "Those pine hills full of shadows — those river reaches — those bluffs of maple and smooth trunked beech — with drifts of white blossom everywhere. I love Norval as I have never loved any place, save Cavendish." Montgomery lived there between


1926-1935 with her husband, a minister at Norval Presbyterian Church. The community has planned an interesting and fun-packed weekend with activities for everyone. Festivities will begin on Saturday with two church bazaars: one will take place in the Anglican Parish Hall, 9 a.m. to noon. Montgomery used to perform in community plays on the stage there. The other bazaar, which also features lunch, is at the United Church, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. There will be horse and buggy tours of the village available both Saturday and Sunday. Rides are \$6 for adults and \$4 for children. Last

year these were fully booked before the weekend, so call ahead to book early. For the first time, the manse where Montgomery lived will be open to the public. The room upstairs in the manse where she did her writing will be open for viewing, 2-4 p.m. During the nine years that she lived here, she wrote five novels, including *Emily's Quest*, *Magic for Marigold*, *A Tangled Web*, *Pat of Silverbush* and *Mistress Pat*. Built in 1888, the manse is still home to the minister of the church, John Giurin and his family. On Saturday historical displays will be set up by the Norval

Women's Institute, the Esquesing Historical Society, the Halton Region Museum and the Peel Region Museum. Members will also be available to answer questions. Dr. Mary Rubio, co-author of the journals of the famous author, will be the guest speaker right after the Sunday morning service at 11:15 a.m. at the Presbyterian Church. You can also meet Rubio, a professor at the University of Guelph, after lunch at Crawfords on Sunday. At Canoe Country Nature Shop, 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., the Norval Community Association is sponsoring children's crafts. The cost is \$3 per child. Children will create a


bird feeder while Sarah the Clown paints animal faces and makes balloons. At 12:30 p.m., Kathy Gastle, dressed for the occasion, will read the children's version of *Anne of Green Gables*. Icing flower demonstrations and afternoon tea will be available at Crawfords and it is being served with Christmas cake prepared with Montgomery's recipe. L. M. M.'s original handwritten recipe book will be on display, too. Many shops will have free draws, drinks and goodies. More activities are being planned. Call Julie at 846-5000 for information and to book buggy rides.




