"We found with too many kids, the days were too long," said Adam Bennett, returning for his fourth year as an instructor. "They will get just as much ice time and they'll get a little more attention."

Bennett will not be the only familiar face at the camp.
Instructors Jay Anderson and Kevin Hughes will also return.

Bennett said keeping the same small group of instructors will help kids returning to the camp feel more comfortable.

The camp is also trying to have "a looser atmosphere," Bennett said. Arrangements are being made for the camp participants to go on a hot air balloon ride and there will be a barbecue on the Wednesday.

The school focuses on basic skating, shooting and puck handling skills through two and

half hours of on-ice instruction each day, two hours of dry-land motor skills training as well as video seminars and guest speakers. Sessions begin at 8:30 a.m. and run until 4:30 p.m. The school is for male and female players between the ages of six and 12 but caters to all skill levels.

"We keep the elite kids together and the kids who need a little extra help together," Bennett said. "We try to assess what's happening on the ice to make sure everyone gets the instruction they need."

The school has already filled half of the spots and Bennett is expecting the usual late rush of applications as the camp draws closer.
