Re: The Brouhaha over 'Transportation Chaos' in Halton Hills

Letter to the Editor;

I have been reading a great deal in community newspapers about traffic congestion in our local Halton Hills area and the need for a plan to deal with increasing transportation chaos.

Like many citizens who have lived in the Halton Hills area since the 1970s and 80s, I, too, have witnessed significant increased traffic volume and speed.

As concerned citizens, we should be familiar with the Halton Hills Transportation Master Plan Report

that came out 4 years ago this November. I have read the 93-page document on line cover to cover and encourage others to do so. The report suggests that the population of Halton Hills will almost double through to 2031, that private automobiles will account for approximately 82 per cent of transit and that there are a number of proposed changes to area roadways and infrastructure to 2031.

Anyone who lives in this area should be aware of what is proposed and what's in the

future as this issue affects the quality of our lives in Halton Hills.
