Mayor calls for enhanced federal funding

Mayor Rick Bonnette has thrown his support behind a call by his fellow municipal leaders to all federal party leaders to commit to a new long-term funding approach to address the chronic shortfall in infrastructure funding.

A joint letter from all Greater Toronto and Hamilton Mayors and Regional Chairs, which was also signed by Mayor Bonnette, is being sent to the leaders of the main federal parties, and it reads: "Our municipal governments need a federal government that is a strong and reliable partner. We need long-term, sustainable, predictable and reliable federal funding which flows year in and year out and will allow us to eliminate our infrastructure deficit within a generation."

The letter, which is endorsed by elected municipal officials representing some six million people in this region, also contains an expression of profound concern the municipal leaders have over the current infrastructure deficit in the region and the need for a new fiscal partnership with the federal government to help eliminate the deficit.

"The current funding system which is project/ application based, simply does not do an adequate job of funding infrastructure projects," said Mayor Bonnette. "We need a system that will provide funding assistance on an ongoing and reliable manner, so that we can make the investments required to keep our economy moving forward."

The municipal officials cite the current federal election as an appropriate time to get a new level of commitment for local infrastructure investments from the federal leaders. "With a federal election approaching, we feel it's appropriate and necessary to put our collective position on this matter forward and seek a clear, unequivocal commitment from yourself and your party."

The letter was agreed to during a joint meeting cochaired by Toronto Mayor John Tory and Region of Durham Chair Roger Anderson. Mayors from all 30 communities in the GTHA attended the October 6 meeting and endorsed the

In addition to calling for a revamped funding model for infrastructure, the leaders made a joint call for increased federal funding for social housing. "Additionally, lack of adequate federal funding for social housing represents not only a compelling social concern, but an economic one as well.'

Halton Hills Fire Department parttime Firefighter recruitment drive

Be part of a group of dedicated individuals working to protect and save lives of people in their community.


As a part-time fire fighter with the Halton Hills Fire Department you will face new and challenging situations unlike any other job. You will fight fires, perform rescues, administer first aid, deal with hazardous materials, protect property and possibly be instrumental in saving lives.

Due to the expanding growth of our community and fire department attrition, the need for additional part-time personnel has become necessary. This additional staff will complement the current staffing at the Head Quarters Station and the Maple Avenue Station in Georgetown and the Churchill Road Station in Acton.

Deputy Chief John Martin says: "We are hiring probationary fire fighters to complement our current part-time staff". Martin continued to say: "We are looking for staff members that live in the immediate area where the stations are located." To be eligible for consideration as a parttime fire fighter you must live within 5km of the station to which you are assigned. Staff living within 3km of the station will be given preferential consideration. Applicants available during daytime hours will also receive greater consideration.

Assistant Deputy Chief Bruce Morrison says: "The recruitment drive will run during the month of October and into early November. The closing date for applications is Thursday, November 5 at 4 p.m. Applicant evaluations will be conducted through November and December 2015, and January 2016. The anticipated start date for the group would be February,
