The Acton Legion receives a "Tank Buster" monumen

It's taken three years, but on Thursday, October 22 the Acton Legion received a new monument; an M-109 self-propelled 155mm howitzer-or "Tank Buster" as called by the artillery because of the unit's range, destructive power and accuracy.

After being demilitarizedwhich renders the unit unable to fire, drive, or move, as well as welding all doors closed-the unit was shipped from Montreal to the Acton Legion then hoisted into position on a concrete pad by crane at the rear of the building. The installation of this new monument is a way to honour members of the Canadian Armed Forces past, present and future.

"It was an awful lot of emails and phone calls to get this all put into place," said Br-197 Special Projects Chairman, Wes Kutasienski. "This has been a labour of love.'

Former Branch President George DeRabbie sent a request to the Department of National Defense (DND) for a piece of military equipment back in the fall of 2012. Kutasienski took over the project after DeRabbie moved out of province and decided to search for a larger unit.

"I had to be certified to receive the equipment, which means security clearances and all

sorts of wonderful things," Kutasienski said, explaining why the entire process took three years. "We were slated one year ago, but they had a problem with contractor, with security clearance, so it was put back another year."

Thanks to local contractors and volunteers helping with the installation, as well as Acton Precast Concrete supplying pads at no charge, the entire cost of the installation was only \$1100-\$100 for the security clearance course Kutasienski had to take, and \$1000 for the crane to move the equipment.

"I did not accomplish this alone," Kutasienski said.

"My friend and comrade, Les Bent-

ley, has assisted in more ways than I care to count, and was always ready and willing to convince other members of the community to pitch in with their labor and equipment."

The unit itself was built in the United States in 1976 and was shipped to the Combat Training Centre in Gagetown, New Brunswick in 1977 where it was used for artillery training. In 1981, the unit was moved to the Royal Canadian Heavy Artillery (RCHA) in Shilo, Manitoba

where it continued to be used for training before being shipped to RCHA in Petawawa in 1992. Again the unit was used for training until it was retired from service in 2002.

Kutasienski hopes to add

more monuments in the future. He would like to add something from the Navy like a ship anchor, and expects to receive an M1-13 armoured personnel carrier in the near future.
