Town employee recognized with Smart Commute Champion Award by Metrolinx

Police investigating death of firefighter and wife after house fire

A Halton Hills firefighter, Trevor McNally, and his wife, Susanne Nesbitt-McNally, are dead after a fire in their Eden Mills home on Friday, November 20.

Wellington County OPP responded to a call reporting a structure fire at the couples' Lowrie Lane home shortly after 9 a.m. The Guelph/Eramosa Fire Department with Puslinch Fire and Rescue Services extinguished the fire, removing McNally and his wife from the home and taking them to a local hospital where they were pronounce deceased.

The Wellington County OPP crime unit and the Office of the Ontario Fire Marshal are investigating the incident. While post mortems were conducted this past Sunday, police have not yet released the cause of death due to the ongoing nature of the investigation.

A statement issued by Halton Hills Fire Chief, Brent Marshall said, "The Halton Hills Fire Department and Town of Halton Hills are deeply saddened by the deaths of Trevor and Sue McNally. We extend our deepest condolences to family and friends."

The statement went on to explain that the Fire Department would not address speculation as to the circumstances surrounding the couples' deaths. "Halton Hills Fire was very supportive, committed and involved in the health and wellbeing of Trevor and Sue. We join our community in wishing that they rest in peace."

44-year-old McNally had been a member of The Halton Hills Fire Department since 2005, and was hired on fulltime in 2007. Nesbitt-McNally, who was 45-years-old, had worked as legal assistant.

As Wellington OPP continues their investigation and as more details become available, our coverage will continue.
