Halton guide and waste collection calendar on the way



Since 2008, single-family

households in Halton have diverted over 60 per cent of their waste from Halton's landfill site. This tremendous effort has extended the lifespan of the site from 2012 to 2044, saving taxpavers over \$15 million by deferring the significant cost of building a new landfill. Waste diversion continues to be a good thing both for the environment and the economy.
