Robinson pins down first Rebel boys gold in 19 years

Wrestlers from Georgetown District High School came away with two medals, a fourth-place result and an outstanding achievement for a rookie at the recent Ontario championships in Windsor.

Kyle Robinson became the first Rebel gold medalist for a male athlete from the school since Mitch Dodd was victorious in his weight class in 1997.

Robinson prevailed over an opponent from Brantford 6-4 in the gold medal final for the boys 61 kg. category. The Grade 12 student will attend the University of Guelph and wrestle for the Gryphons varsity team next year.
