Raiders score 5-4 OT victory to jump back into series

Winger Ryan Takamatsu picked the perfect time to haunt the team that cut him loose earlier in this Ontario Junior Hockey League season as the Georgetown Raiders rallied back to defeat the host North York Rangers 5-4 Sunday afternoon.

After dropping the first two games of the best-of-7 South/West Conference semifi-

nal series on home ice, Sunday's win rescued the first-place Raiders from an unexpected nosedive against the fifth-seeded Rangers.

Takamatsu converted a pass from Daniel Hardie for the clincher just over seven minutes into extra time.

Game four took place Wednesday night at the Herb Carnegie Centennial TAI Centre and game five of the series is set for the Alcott Arena on Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

The 10-point difference in the regularseason standings hasn t translated to Georgetown dominance in the tightly contested matchup, as the Raiders took a 2-0 lead early in the second period Sunday, only to have the Rangers score four straight markers to hold an apparently comfortable advantage head-



But linemates Jordan Crocker and Brendan Jacome netted their second goals of the game in the final frame to force overtime and goalie Andrew Masters responded well after being replaced by backup Billy Day for a few minutes to preserve the victory.

Sydney tracking down gold

Gearing up to race against the best velodrome cyclists in Canada early next month, local resident Je Land Sydney earned gold and silver medals at the Ontario Track Provincial Championships held recently at the Mattamy National Cycling Centre in Milton.

The Grade 11 Georgetown District High School student placed first in the Jr. Men Match Sprint and second in his first attempt at competing in the Jr. Men one-kilo event out of a field of 14 riders.

Representing London's Team Kallisto Forest City Velodrome under coach Rob Good, the 17-year-old Sydney thought he had won silver in the Jr. Men Keirin at the provincials as well, but was disqualified for what a judge ruled to be dangerous riding.

Another Georgetown resident, Eric Bartolomeo, placed fourth in the Jr. Men Keirin 7-12 final and was second as part of the National Cycling Centre Hamilton entry in the Jr. Men Team Pursuit final.

The Canadian Track Championships for the junior and under-17 categories will also take place at the Mattamy National Cycling Centre April 1-3.

Bases loaded for minor baseball
