

Originally located in Limehouse, the Gowdy family three-seat outhouse was built circa 1840. Neoclassical/Georgian in style, the wooden structure featured a gabled roof, horizontal lap siding on the sides, with a panel door featuring three over two pane sidelights. This unique privy was moved in 1971, and restored for its opening at Black Creek Pioneer Village in Toronto in 1972, where it remains today.
