
## **COMMENT**



With a history dating back to 1832, Brain Brewery was located on Steeles Ave., just east of Hornby. John Brain s original beer recipe had a whopping 80 per cent alcohol content, but he reluctantly reduced it to 30 per cent when his clientele complained. Closed down under prohibition in 1916, it reopened in 1927, but never enjoyed the same success, due in part to stiffer competition in the marketplace. While the brewery is long gone, the original Brain family home still stands today.



We were very pleased to receive word recently that the Town of Hal-


