Town staff reviewing raccoon distemper strategy

Complaints from town residents in recent weeks involving sick raccoons on private property has prompted town council to review how it deals with this issue.

The community affairs committee presented council with a recommendation to amend the canine and wildlife services contract to include provisions for attending to sick or injured wildlife on private property on Tuesday.

Council agreed to contract Halton Hills Animal Control to provide the removal of sick animals from private properties as a trial for 18 months. The Town also agreed to purchase four large animal traps, at a cost of \$100 to \$150 per trap, to be rented to residents at a cost of \$5 per day, with an initial returnable deposit of \$100.

To tell residents to call MNR (Ministry of Natural Resources) is unacceptable. I think we need to expand the service, Mayor Rick Bon-

nette said at the last council meeting. It can destroy your pet, kill you dog. This is not like chasing a bird off your property. I think we need to do

Canine distemper is a virus that affects the respiratory, gastrointestinal and nervous systems of raccoons and other animals such as dogs. It is not transmitted to humans or cats, experts say. But unvaccinated pets are at risk of getting it by coming in contact with an affected animal or its bodily fluids.

At its worst, the disease may cause a raccoon to suffer neurological impairment, paralysis or death. It is often mistaken for rabies by onlookers.

We are not really in the hot zone for raccoon rabies but we are in the surveillance area, Douglas Campbell, Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative, Veterinarian, said from his office in Guelph. Nobody wants to have any contact with a raccoon that is acting strangely anyway. This is best left to a professional.
