Council votes to ban door-to-door solicitors

Halton Hills Town Council voted through a resolution to ban the doorto-door sales of energy products—including furnaces, air conditioners, water treatment devices and water heaters—at the council meeting on Monday, May 30. The resolution is in support of the Private Member's bill and also appeals to the Provincial Government to adopt said bill as a law in Ontario.

Citing aggressive, unsolicited and misleading sales tactics experienced by residents across the province as a key factor for the motion, it also notes that often vulnerable individuals are targeted as a result of these unscrupulous sales tactics.

"Anyone who has ever been pestered by these people, it's incredibly annoying, incredibly deceiving. If you almost play along with them for a moment, it's just down right misrepresentation and lies," said Regional Councillor, Clark Somerville. "They really need to do something and to stop it. We have had the issue before with the energy retailers. Thankfully, they've disappeared, but unfortunately there's a new crop of weasels that have popped up."

Mayor Rick Bonnette had his own troubling experience with these door-to-door sales people when a few years earlier he learned of an individual presenting the Mayor's business card and claiming that Bonnette had endorsed the product the


salesmen was pedalling. "There is no depth that

"There is no depth that they won't go down to try to make a sale," said Bonnette. "It was very disturbing for me."

Bonnette also noted that residents should remember that their utility companies would never ask to see an individual's bill as they would already have access to it.
